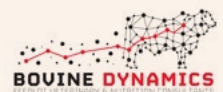

Ian Langford, Professor (Brigadier [Retd]), PhD, DSC and Bars.

Professor (Brigadier Retd) Ian Langford is a former senior officer of the Australian Defence Force with 30 years of leadership experience in complex operational and strategic environments. During his military career, he commanded the 2nd Commando Regiment, led multiple Special Operations Task Groups in Afghanistan and Iraq, and served twice as Head of Land Capability, overseeing the Army's future capability development, major acquisitions, and strategic investments.

His operational service included deployments to Timor-Leste, Afghanistan, Bougainville, Solomon Islands, Iraq, Israel, Lebanon, Syria, and the South-West Pacific. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross on three occasions, was appointed Honorary Aide-de-Camp to the Governor-General of Australia in 2019, has been patron of the Defence Entrepreneur's Forum

and is a Distinguished Graduate of the United States Marine Corps Command and Staff College and the School of Advanced Warfighting.

Ian holds a Bachelor of Management, Master of Arts, Master of Defence Studies, Master of Strategic Studies, and a PhD from Deakin University. He is also a Distinguished Graduate of Australian Institute of Company Directors and has completed the Senior Executive Leadership (ANU), Senior Leadership in National Security and the Senior Leadership in Government (Harvard) programs. Since retiring from the Army in 2023, Ian has founded Burran Consultancy, serves on several boards, is a Professor at the University of New South Wales, and is Executive Director of the Security and Defence PLUS Alliance and has been published many times as an independent author, essayist and editor.



Su McCluskey, Chair, Crawford Fund for Food Security

Su McCluskey is Chair of the Crawford Fund for Food Security, Director of LiveCorp, a member of the National Food Council and the CSIRO Food and Agriculture Advisory Group and a CPA and ATSE Fellow. A beef cattle farmer from Yass NSW, Su was most recently Interim Chief Executive of the National Farmers' Federation and prior to this was Australia's inaugural Special Representative for Australian Agriculture, advocating for sustainability, global food security and trade and market access. Su was a Director

of Australian Unity, Commissioner for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR), Commissioner on the National COVID-19 Advisory Board, a member of the Harper Competition Policy Review, CEO of the Regional Australia Institute and the Council of Rural Research and Development Corporations and the Executive Director of the Office of Best Practice Regulation. She has also held senior positions with the Business Council of Australia and the Australian Taxation Office.



Saul Eslake, Economist

Saul Eslake is a leading Australian economist with more than 25 years' experience in financial markets, including senior roles as Chief Economist at ANZ, Bank of America Merrill Lynch (Australia & New Zealand), and McIntosh Securities, as well as Chief Economist (International) at National Mutual Funds Management.

He was Director of the Productivity Growth Program at the Grattan Institute before establishing his own economics consultancy in Hobart in 2015. He also serves as a Vice-Chancellor's Fellow at the University of Tasmania.

Saul has advised multiple Australian governments on fiscal policy, including reviews of Tasmania's public sector finances and assessments of government business investments, and is currently

advising an ACT Legislative Assembly Select Committee on fiscal sustainability. He is also a member of the Australian Parliamentary Budget Office Advisory Panel, the Australian Taxation Office Tax Gap Advisory Panel, the Advisory Board of Jamieson Coote Bonds, and the Board of the Council on the Ageing.

He holds a first-class Honours degree in Economics from the University of Tasmania, a Graduate Diploma in Applied Finance and Investment from the Securities Institute of Australia, completed the Senior Executive Program at Columbia University, and was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws (LLD) by the University of Tasmania in 2012.

Kee Jim was born and raised on a small seedstock/commercial cow calf operation located in the Interior of British Columbia. He received his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (D.V.M.) in 1983 from the Western College of Veterinary Medicine, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. Following graduation, he moved to Okotoks, Alberta and established G.K. Jim Farms and the consulting company Feedlot Health Management Services Ltd.

A highly respected veterinarian and cattle industry leader, Dr. Jim has received numerous honours, including the American Association of Bovine Practitioners Practitioner of the Year, the Beef Award for Excellence in Preventative Medicine, the Canadian Animal Health Institute Leadership Award, and recognition as one of the six VIPs of Feedlot Medicine by Bovine Veterinarian.

Over four decades, he has grown G.K. Jim Farms from the purchase of six percent share pen of 300 head into a major cattle enterprise

operating across Canada and the United States, with interests in backgrounding, grazing, feeding, and feedlot operations. G.K. Jim Farms operates across numerous geographies including Alberta, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Quebec, Idaho, California, New Mexico, Texas, Nebraska, Colorado, Iowa, Wisconsin, and Georgia.

He has also served on the boards of numerous industry organisations, including the Canadian Cattlemen's Association, Canada Beef Export Federation (Chair), and the Alberta Cattle Feeders' Association (Vice Chair), while advising leading food and agriculture policy institutions. His recent recognitions include induction into the Cattle Feeders Hall of Fame (2024) and the Alberta Agriculture Hall of Fame (2025), as well as being named among the Top 10 Innovators of Canadian Agriculture and one of the Top 12 Canada's most influential farmers by Country Guide 2011.

Darren Hamblin is the owner and manager of Strathdale Wagyu and Struggle Downs Feedlot, with more than 25 years' experience across the Wagyu beef supply chain. Since beginning Strathdale Wagyu in 2000, Darren has built a vertically connected business spanning breeding, backgrounding, custom feeding, carcass data, genetics, branded beef and feedlot finishing. His approach has been shaped by a strong focus on performance, traceability

and continuous improvement. The development of Master beef -a carcass assessment and reporting platform - reflects his long-running interest in using better data to drive better decisions. More recently, Struggle Downs Feedlot has brought that same thinking into a purpose-built, fully shedded feedlot environment, combining practical stockmanship with technology, automation and bold infrastructure investment.

Tony has been a senior veterinary consultant to beef feedlots in Australia for 25 years and also served Apiam Animal Health as a business unit manager for intensive animals and ACE laboratories. Through his work and leadership, he helped pave the way for skilled Filipino agricultural workers in Australian feedlots, many of whom have since advanced into supervisory and management roles. Arnel has held leadership positions in major feedlot operations, including

at Goonoo Feedlot of the Australian Agricultural Company, and was a speaker at ALFA BeefEx 2012. Brett Welsh, Allstars Australian Performance Horses

Brett Welsh is a third-generation horseman from northern NSW, now based near Beaudesert in Queensland, where he operates Allstars Australian Performance Horses with his family. He has built a career around practical horsemanship, Australian Stock Horses,

campdrafting, live arena shows and performance horse training, with experience spanning station work, competition, entertainment and film. A more recent string to his bow is training safe horses for pen-riders in Australian feedlots.



Glen Boss, Champion jockey & Melbourne Cup winner

With three consecutive Melbourne Cup triumphs, Glen Boss is one of Australia's most accomplished and successful jockeys. His feats of piloting Makybe Diva to victory in the 2003, 2004 and 2005 Melbourne Cups not only guaranteed Boss a celebrated place in Australian turf history but rewarded his determination to return to the saddle after a serious race fall threatened his career.

When Boss slipped from his mount in torrential rain on a racetrack in Macau in June 2002 the initial medical verdict pointed to an abrupt ending to his high-profile career. Twelve months later, Boss lined up for the 3200 metres classic in 2003 knowing that victory would ensure him a place in Australian turf history. Victory on the first Tuesday in November 2004, when the nation stopped for Australia's most famous horse race, elevated Boss into a special

category - the first jockey to win back-to-back Melbourne Cups and then an incredible three-peat in 2005.

Beaudesert-born, Glen Boss has had a special relationship with horses since he was a toddler growing up on the family's cattle property at Caboolture. As a youngster he won a lot of pony club awards and did his share of breaking in horses. Leaving school at 15, he moved to Gympie to start his riding apprenticeship and after riding 60 winners in less than 10 months he moved on to the Gold Coast where success followed him and since his debut as a senior jockey in 1990 he has ridden 45 Group 1 winners in his home state of Queensland with the 2003, 2004 and 2005 Melbourne Cup victories aboard Makybe Diva stand out like a beacon.
